Willie Wagtail

A small, wiggle-tailed bird that feeds on bugs and berries.

Red Wattlebird

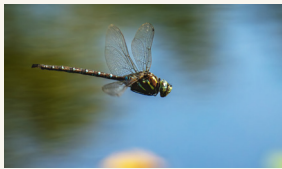
Loves the smell of flowers that produce rich nectar.

Growling Grass Treefrog

Listen out for them hiding in the grassy areas or near the waterways.

Dragonfly

Hovers above the wetlands, pollinating plants.

Blue Wren

Found low-down in the bushes and tall grasses.

New Holland Honeyeater

Attracted to the nectar of native plants and flowers.

Commemorative Tree

A tree stump in honour of the 1969 bushfire.

Yarning Circle

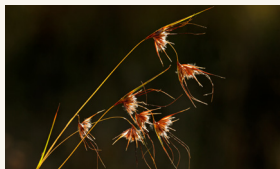
A place to share stories in the Bunurong culture.

River Red Gum

Once used to create shelters canoes and shields.

Kangaroo Grass

Long blade-like grass with brown seed pods.

Australian Saltbush

Grey-green leaves that flower in spring.

Dianella

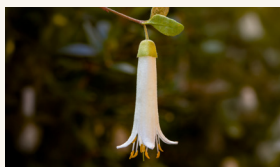
Purple flowers that attract butterflies and birds.

Bull-Oak

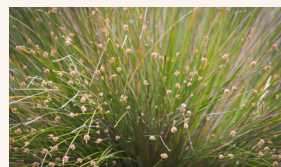
Long thin leaves, with spikey seed pods.

Correa Glabra

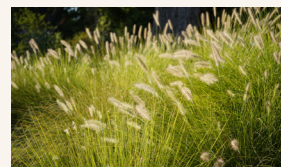
Green tubular flowers that can grow 1.5m high.

Knobby-Club Rush

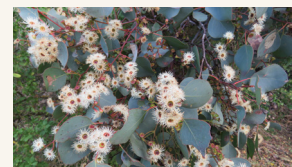
Thin, green grass with spikey bulbs at the top.
